





OST DAYS THE FAMILY DOG comes with me to the office. On one such day a few months ago, she looked out the front door and started growling. I could not imagine what was triggering this good natured dog. I looked around the parking area and then I saw the source of her aggravation in the front ditch; she was growling at a large water fowl bird in the flooded ditch.

We are loving the new building, but as with most any property, it has a few things to be desired. The culverts are completely buried by a ton of mud and totally stopped up, flooding the property when it just minimally rains. We have made the best of this problem and have only had to close a few times due to the extreme levels of water in the parking area.

I called the city and we are on the list to have the culverts maintained, but their list is long and they are pretty short handed. So as we patiently [for the most part] wait, some interesting things have unfolded. One day, I noticed that there were probably 100 little mud towers all over that part of the property. Our Art Director, Garrett Johnson, told me they were Crawfish towers. I had never heard of such a thing, so I could not help but research it. I ran across this information from the Missouri Conservation website:

"Burrowing crayfish also provide services that more directly benefit their human neighbors. One study showed that prairie crayfish burrow to depths greater than 3 feet, while other species' burrows extend to 15 feet. This deep digging improves subsurface waterflow and soil structure by mixing and moving nutrients closer to the surface where they can be used by many plant species."

"And with their enhancement of subsurface water flow, our burrowing neighbors have created natural irrigation systems that operate both horizontally and vertically.

So did God send us temporary help in the form of Crawfish? It may have not eliminated the problem but the temporary help of any kind is appreciated. Sometimes you have to look for blessings in unexpected places. I hope you find the small blessings in the most unusual places today. And as always, thank you for reading Searcy Living.




### Adventures with faith

For a sweet treat, The local Food Truck, Wild Flour Bakery was on site to sell their handmade cupcakes, macarons, and signature tea and coffee drinks.







## **OVER THE COUNTER**

#### Hitting a Nerve: An Introduction to Neuropathy

EUROPATHY IS MOST COMMONLY DEFINED as damage to nerve cells in the peripheral nervous system, the part of the nervous system that spans outside of your brain and spinal cord. People with neuropathy may feel weakness, numbness, tingling, or pain in the hands or feet. They would commonly describe it as a feeling of pins and needles on the skin. Neuropathy occurs in approximately 8% of people over the age of 65 years old. Other than age, individuals with diabetes, people who have experienced trauma, and those who have a high alcohol intake are at an increased risk of developing neuropathy.

Diabetes is the leading cause of neuropathy. According to a study completed by the Journal of Diabetes Education, over half of people with diabetes will experience neuropathy at some point in their life. Diabetic neuropathy is caused by high blood sugar levels that results in nerve fiber damage in the hands, legs and feet. Trauma is also a common cause of neuropathy. Injuries from falls, car accidents, bone fractures, and sports injuries can result in neuropathy. Autoimmune disorders such as Guillain-Barre syndrome, lupus, rheumatoid arthritis, and some infections, including chickenpox, shingles, HIV, syphilis, Lyme disease, and Hepatitis C can be the cause of certain neuropathies. Neuropathy may also result from kidney disorders, liver disorders, and people with an underactive thyroid.

Symptoms of neuropathy vary depending on the cause and location of the nerves involved, and may be short-term or long-term. Common symptoms are:

- Tingling or numbness
- Muscle weakness
- Sharp burning or throbbing pain
- Muscle twitching, cramps or spasms
- Extreme sensitivity to touch
- Paralysis
- Falling or loss of coordination
- Loss of muscle control, dropping things
- Loss of feeling in extremities
- Low blood pressure or abnormal heart rate

Neuropathy symptoms typically progress in four stages:

**STAGE ONE** is categorized as numbness and pain. In the beginning, patients typically become aware that something feels "off" in their hands or feet. The problem may not seem too severe at this point, and patients likely continue on in their daily life without seeking medical attention. These symptoms then progress into stage two, a constant pain.

**STAGE TWO** is when the pain becomes more apparent and harder to endure. It is generally at that point when patients decide to seek medical help. Please know that the sooner patients seek treatment, the higher likelihood of reversing any nerve damage.

**STAGE THREE** begins when pain progresses to an intense level. These patients will experience pain daily, and will likely have issues completing tasks that they used to do without hesitation, such as walking barefoot.

**THE LAST STAGE**, stage four, is a complete numbness or loss of sensation. If people do not receive medical attention for neuropathy, they will eventually lose feeling in their lower limbs. This loss of feeling will likely lead to injury and amputations.

If neuropathy does occur, there are several treatment options available, and some cases of neuropathy may be easily treated or even cured. The main priority in managing neuropathy is to identify and treat any underlying medical problems, such as diabetes or an infection. If neuropathy cannot be cured, the goal of treatment is to manage and control symptoms to prevent further nerve damage. Medications can be used to control neuropathic pain. These medications include some antidepressants, anticonvulsants, and topical patches and creams containing lidocaine. Narcotic drugs like opioids are not recommended for the treatment of neuropathy, as they have not been proven effective in managing neuropathic pain. Physical therapy can aid in neuropathy management by using a combination of focused exercise, massage, and other treatment methods that help increase patient strength, balance, and range of motion. Occupational therapy is an adaptive treatment used to help patients cope with pain and loss of function, as well as teach new skills to make up for this loss. Medical aids, such as braces, specially designed shoes, casts, and splints may be used to help reduce pain by providing support and keeping damaged nerves in proper alignment to prevent further damage. The most beneficial way to reduce your risk of developing neuropathy is by properly controlling your existing medical conditions and implementing a healthy lifestyle.

Here are some tips to help prevent neuropathy:

**MANAGE YOUR DIABETES** properly and try to keep your blood sugar levels within the ranges recommended by your doctor.

**TAKE PROPER CARE OF YOUR FEET.** If you have diabetes or poor blood flow, it is important to perform a daily self-foot exam. Look for sores, blisters, redness, calluses, or dry or cracking skin.

**DECLUTTER YOUR FLOORS.** 

#### QUIT SMOKING.

**TAKE STEPS** towards adopting a healthy lifestyle. Eat a balanced diet, maintain a healthy weight, exercise regularly, and minimize alcohol intake.

**LASTLY, REVIEW YOUR MEDICATIONS** with your doctor or pharmacist about all prescription and over-the-counter medications that you take. ◆









#### **Snicker Dates**

(no chocolate and no processed **or** artificial sweetener)





**DATES** 10 whole



**PEANUT BUTTER** <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c, with NO SUGAR (contains just peanuts!)



**PEANUTS** 1/4 c, dry roasted (halves and pieces)



**COCONUT OIL** 2 tsp, (enough just to make it spreadable, then crisp when chilled)



**CAROB POWDER** 2 Tbsp, (use cocoa if you want)





**SALT** A pinch and additional for sprinkling on tops


- **1.** In a small non stick skillet (ceramic or a well seasoned cast iron pan is ideal) over VERY low heat, combine the coconut oil, carob powder, and honey and stir with a rubber scraper/spatula until it's all mixed well and is shiny and spreadable.
- **2.** Meanwhile remove seeds (and any stem caps) from the dates by making a lengthwise slit in each, prying it open a bit and removing the large seed.
- **3.** Fill cavity of date with enough peanut butter to almost full then top the sticky peanut butter with a coating of dry roasted peanuts.
- **4.** Once all the dates are seeded, filled with peanut butter and topped with dry roasted peanuts, spread a teaspoon size dollop of the carob/honey mixture on each date, covering the peanuts.
- **5.** Place dates on a tray and chill until ready to serve. Enjoy!






# **MEDIGAP** Medicare Supplement

**MEDIGAP** (also known as Medicare Supplement) plans pay IN ADDITION to Medicare.

Plans are standardized and identified by a letter, so all Plan A benefits are the same with any company offering a Plan A. Depending on the plan you choose, you may or may not have any out-of-pocket costs. Plan F is the most comprehensive plan – it pays 100% of the costs for all Medicare-approved services after Medicare. Plan F is only available to individuals who turned 65 prior to January 1, 2020. Plan G is also a very comprehensive plan. It pays 100% of the costs for all Medicare-approved services after Medicare, EXCEPT the Part B deductible (\$233 for 2022). Medigap plans do not include outpatient prescription drug coverage. The monthly premium varies by company. You continue to pay your Medicare Part B premium in addition to the Medigap premium.


Medigap has an initial guaranteed issue enrollment period called Open Enrollment. This normally occurs the first month you are enrolled in Part B and are age 65. The Open Enrollment Period will last for 6 months. After the Open Enrollment Period, carriers have the right to deny you coverage based on medical conditions. Outside of the Open Enrollment there are certain scenarios that may still allow you to qualify for coverage regardless of health.

There are programs to help those who have a lower income. If you have full Medicaid coverage, get help from the state Medicaid program paying your Part B premiums or you get Supplemental Security Income benefits, you will automatically qualify for Extra Help. If you do not automatically qualify for Extra Help, you can apply any time: visit socialsecurity.gov/i1020 to apply online or call Social Security at 1-800-72-1213.

# The House That Searcy Built

CHRIS HEARD A LOUD SNAP. Suddenly, he was falling. He landed hard on the ground. When he looked at his legs, they pointed in a different direction than he thought. "Not good!" his mind screamed. He tried to move his feet. No response.

January 25, 2021, had started like any other day for builder and carpenter, Chris French. Footwork, framing, and trim were his specialties and after 15+ years he did it well. Even with all the shortages of building supplies, he had been very busy.

He remembered being up on scaffolding supported by ladders, bent backward, nailing a 2 X 6 board on the edge of the rafters, prepping for decking a house. In a freak accident, the new ladder had broken.

The first responders came quickly. A surgery team stood prepped and waiting by the time they got to the hospital. "Now what?" thought Chris. He knew he'd never be able to get back into his own house. There's no way he could get around in there. He also knew he had a long road to recovery.

But God was working behind the scenes in mighty ways that Chris didn't know about at the time.

His brother, Tony, reached out to Rick Eichhorn at Habitat for Humanity. The board of directors looked at his situation and quickly voted to move forward to help. They had never built a fully ADA-compliant house before, and it presented some unique challenges. One of those challenges was the astronomical rise in the price of building supplies. They had to economically build a small house that was ADA-compliant, and keep the cost as low as possible.

In the building community, news of Chris's accident spread like wildfire. The people at Habitat for Humanity knew Chris already because of his volunteer work on Habitat houses in the past. Lots of other people knew Chris as well, and they all pulled together to help.

"If it wasn't for the donations and the support from the donors we couldn't have done it. There was an outpouring of donations, help, and labor; primarily from construction industry."

Hoffmann Architectural volunteered their design services. The Duncan family donated the lot for the house to be built on. It was the perfect place since it was close to family. Tree Amigos came and trimmed the trees and one of the Habitat board members, Adam Quattlebaum, did the survey for the lot.

Tony reached out to other builders that he and Chris had worked for before including Patrick Connell and Scott Coleman. The city of Searcy and all the code enforcers bent over backward to help them as well, giving advice on how to do things to meet all the requirements.

On a hot day in August, approximately 7 months after Chris's accident, Austin Riley came out with his son and daughter, marked the house off, and dug the footing. As he worked he told them how Chris had done all the trim work on their house. Chris's new home was officially started!

Things started happening fast after that. The more people heard about the project the more they wanted to help with both labor and materials. It became a true community project and a labor of love for Chris to show him how much the whole community cared.

Austin Ready Mix donated all the concrete for the house, which for a fully ADA-compliant house included lots of ramps and sidewalks. ABC Block donated the mortar, blocks, and sand, while Larry Steele donated his time and expertise doing all the blockwork. Vulcan Quarry donated all the rock and gravel needed.

It was not just expert builders that came either. Chris's church, Highway Church of Christ showed up in force with a large group. Ron Smith, a Harding University professor brought a large group from Harding. As they worked, he told his students how he had been Chris's childhood math teacher when his family had been stationed overseas in Turkey.

"It was a God thing. The right people would show up. We had great volunteers. Lots of Harding students showed up. They had lots of energy, but maybe not so much skill. However, we had a lot of pro builders to mentor them. Retired folks and Harding students worked together."

Building experts were matched with young people ready to work and willing to learn. Together, they assembled joists and subfloor, followed quickly by the wall frames. Bryan at Ridout donated all the lumber. Then the trusses went up, donated by A & R Trusses, and Jim and Karin Burress of Absolute Roofing took care of the roof. Then the siding went up, donated by James Hardie Company.





Now Chris's house was officially in the dry and the interior detail work started. By this time, Chris had moved to rehab at TiRR in Houston, TX; one of the best facilities for spinal cord injuries. People were texting him pictures of his new house and communicating with his case manager about what he would need. Since so many people working on the house knew Chris, they wanted to put in special surprises that they knew he would appreciate. They went the extra mile, putting personalized finishing touches on whatever they could think of.

The outpouring of support continued with the interior work. It seemed to Rick that people were coming out of the woodwork to help. Southern Pipe & Supply and Winsupply Plumbing donated all the plumbing pipes and fixtures. Ryan Ingram of Ingram Plumbing installed it all. Taylor Insulation donated all the insulation for the house, Ferrell Stokes of Stokes Electric donated all electrical equipment, and electrical supply houses donated all wire, which had skyrocketed in price. McKenney Electrical Supply donated all of the electrical boxes that were nowhere to be found at the time.

There was a 1-year waiting list for an electrical service panel to go outside. When Elliott Electrical heard about Chris's accident and was approached for help, he remembered falling out of his deer stand 2 years before. "It could have been me," he said and donated the electrical panel.

Jason at Command Construction did all the concrete work, building the sidewalks and ramps that Chris would need to access everything around his home. Lowes donated all the appliances and Wagner Construction built Chris a beautiful custom shower. Doug Leckie contacted Mark Eaton with Air Care. He and all his guys put in a nice heat and air unit.

White River Flooring donated all the flooring and Homer's Ace Hardware donated all the paint. Robert Ross of Edward Jones took a whole day off work and brought his staff out to caulk and paint. Home Hardware Center (formerly McCoys) donated all wood for a back deck and covered porch, which Chris had never had before.

The house was almost done, but then, they heard about something they hadn't expected or accounted for - Chris was learning how to drive!

To keep costs low, most Habitat Houses do not have garages, so they started with the idea of a carport. But once again, God showed up in a big way and the generosity of the people of Searcy came through with brilliant colors.

James Hardie Company offered more siding for an outside covering, Jim and Karin Burress agreed to extend the roof to cover it, Taylor Insulation also donated more insulation for the garage, and Andy Sills with Garage Door Services donated a garage door and garage door opener. Before Rick knew it, they had all the pieces for a full-out garage instead of just a carport!

The Habitat for Humanity Restore also plays a large part in this whole process. Habitat for Humanity's goal is to provide decent and affordable housing to homeowners that pay an affordable mortgage. The upfront money to build the house comes from the earnings of the Habitat for Humanity Restore. That money is paid back in affordable payments by the homeowner. Every time you donate or buy from the Habitat for Humanity Restore, you are a part of that.

Chris left the hotel rooms and rehab facilities that he had lived in for over a vear behind and was able to move into his new home in March of 2023. It was a long journey, but now he has a place that he's able to call home. There are still a few finishing touches, such as the sod from Double Springs Sod. Chris also hopes they can build a few raised bed gardens for him as well, so that he can explore a gardening hobby. Lincoln Lawn Care was quick to offer to help.

"They really spoiled me with a lot of this stuff. I've Never even had a garage before or a dishwasher. Everything else is nicer than I've had before."

There have been a few hiccups along the way, like Chris getting stuck in his custom-built shower; unable to get out. Habitat was there for that too. They tore out everything, jackhammered it to the ground, and built a new one.

When Habitat for Humanity builds a house for someone, it's not just about building a house, it's about building long-lasting relationships. Getting affordable housing is a great step towards a better quality of life for anyone. Now that Chris has a comfortable and functional place to call home he can focus on whatever is next in his life. �

# Are your goals

# 'MUST HAVE' OR 'NICE TO HAVE'?

LIKE EVERYONE, you may have a lot of financial goals. But are they all of equal importance? Probably not. And do they share a similar timeline? Again, it's unlikely. So, your first step may be to prioritize your goals — and then follow a process that can help you achieve them.

#### This process should include the following steps:

- IDENTIFY YOUR GOALS AS "MUST HAVE" OR "NICE **TO HAVE."** Making sure you can retire comfortably and won't outlive your resources is a "must have" goal. For this goal, you can't compromise - you need to be certain of achieving it, or at least as certain as possible. But if you want to someday own a vacation home by the beach, and you can't ever quite afford it, you might find an acceptable substitute, such as renting. So, it seems fair to say that achieving this goal would be "nice to have."
- PRIORITIZE YOUR INVESTMENT DOLLARS. Unless you have unlimited sums to invest — and very few of us have that luxury — you'll probably need to prioritize where your investment dollars are going. For your main "must have" goal — retirement you'll be helped by the ability to automatically invest through your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. If you're on track toward this goal, and you budget carefully and potentially receive salary increases over the years, you may also find space to keep contributing toward the "nice to have" goals.
- PUT "PRICE TAGS" ON YOUR GOALS. You need to know what your goals will cost. Of course, you may need to estimate the costs for some goals based on different factors. For example, when you think about your goal of retiring comfortably without outliving your money, you'll need to consider some key questions, including these: When do you want to retire? What sort of retirement lifestyle do you envision? Do you see yourself downsizing your living arrangements? For other goals, though, such as purchasing a vacation home, you could get more specific on how much money you'll need.

• FOLLOW AN APPROPRIATE STRATEGY. The nature of your goals, and their estimated cost, along with your appetite for risk, should drive your investment strategy - but another key factor is time. So, for a long-term goal like retirement, you'll likely need a reasonable amount of quality growth-oriented investments in your portfolio. While these investments — such as stocks and stock-based mutual funds — will fluctuate in value over shorter periods of time, your hope is that, over several decades, they will ultimately provide the growth you need to meet your retirement goal. However, to achieve a goal you want to meet in a year or so — perhaps you're paying for a wedding or planning a long vacation — you may want to consider more stable investments, such as certificates of deposit (CDs), short-term bonds or even cash or cash equivalents. They may not provide much in the way of growth, but you can essentially count on them to provide the amount you need when you need it. You'll need to regularly review the performance of your investment strategy for each goal to assess your progress.

Achieving any goals — whether they're "must have" or "nice to have" — can be challenging. But by identifying and prioritizing these goals, following an appropriate strategy to meet them, and consistently reviewing your approach, you can help yourself get to where you want to go. �

# SGT. MATT HIGGINS

ATT HIGGINS WATCHED as the State Troopers walked in. He was always struck by their appearance and professionalism when they came in to eat at the restaurant where he worked. He was only a teenager, but his experience at his first job, along with some very personal reasons, led him to his future career.

The restaurant offered free meals to police officers as a thankyou for their service. Many were regulars and Matt always looked forward to when they came in. It is also where he met his wife, Alyssa.

When 9/11 came, like the rest of us, he was transfixed by the situation. He watched not only as the twin towers fell, but as police, firefighters, and first responders did everything they could to help people. They were doing all they could to help keep people safe, rescue them, and provide assistance, even at the risk of their own lives. He wanted a job like that - something that really mattered where he could serve and keep people safe. He wanted to be Chris Amoroso. Not actually him, but his spirit.

He married Alyssa in 2008 and started at the Searcy Police Department shortly thereafter. His first job was patrol. He learned all that he could, and tried to have his hands in a little bit of everything to find out what he loved the most. In the process, he became a drug recognition expert and found what excited him the most was keeping bad guys off the street. Overseeing the department's Special Response Team allows for that. It offers a direct role in putting the most dangerous to society behind bars.

Other, older officers mentored and taught him, and he learned more each day he went to work. With more responsibility, his role gradually changed from mentee to mentor of younger officers. He still considers himself a hard charger, but he quickly shines the light on the officers under his command.

They spend as much time together on duty and off duty as they can. Their kids grow up together, they go camping together, and generally enjoy one another's company. They know that each of them have the other's backs.

For the past several years, Sgt. Higgins has also overseen the department's firearms training. He has a cadre of about 10 instructors that plan the curriculum and conduct the training for the department. The Searcy City Council recently approved the purchase of a red dot handgun platform, putting Searcy PD on the leading edge. He and the rest of his cadre of instructors oversaw that transition.

Sgt. Higgins runs the firearms program for the Central Arkanas Law Enforcement Training Academy with his good friend, Sheriff Chris Brown of Cleburne County. He, along with Sheriff Chris Brown, have designed an entire curriculum that takes young cadets that have never handled a weapon before through the process of becoming firearms proficient. They also have a private company that trains civilians and law enforcement in a number of areas. They specialize in firearms training, but also can provide Arkansas Concealed Handgun Licensing training and self-defense.

When Sgt. Higgins is not on duty or at the range, he's with his family. He and Alyssa have an 8-year-old daughter named Matylee. His great-grandparents were big into family and relationships. That core value has been passed down to him. He tries to do everything he can to develop good relationships. He believes life is about the people.




## **Banded Door Oblique Twists**

# The HOMETOWN BLOGGER

## The Hidden Historian of Searcy & White County

ou may not know her by name, but you've seen her face at the corner of Booth Road and South Main Street in Searcy.

Barbara S. Duncan, Executive Broker for RE/MAX Advantage, has a billboard there. And not everyone knows that she is Searcy's hidden historian – a prolific online blogger of White County history, with 1,950 posts to date.

Google long-gone Searcy favorites like Headlee Drug Store, White House Café, Bill's Grill, Roseann Motel, Ideal Shop, Pastime Pool Hall. Look up news events like the Judsonia tornado of 1952 or an arson fire that destroyed Searcy Junior High in 1980.

At or near the top of the search results will be a Barbara Duncan blog on the subject, with historic photos, dates, details

– and bonus features added by readers in the Comments section.

Her followers include local historians, journalists, city leaders, and White Countians who have moved hither and yon. Arkansas Business magazine gave her a mention a few years ago, saying she has a "quasi-cult following."

"She always has something going on," said Shelly Churchwell, president of the White County Historical Society. "I really like it when she lets me borrow her historical finds."

Many find Barbara Duncan's Blog by accident on Google, either while researching genealogy or conducting research on the old days in White County, Arkansas.

Mike S. Allen, a Harding University graduate, co-authored "A Murder in Searcy," a book about the notorious 1974 murder of Fern Rodgers (wife of Dr. Porter Rodgers). He gave Barbara Duncan's Blog credit in the book even though they had never met.

"When I was conducting research for the book, I would search online for names or places in Searcy from the 1970s. Very often I would come across a post [by Barbara Duncan] that would provide good context or a photo of what I was looking for," he said.

I should tell you now that Barbara Duncan is my mother. I'm a retired newspaper reporter and editor, and she has outwritten me for 17 straight years. Her energy is tireless!

Her blog started 17 years ago as a marketing strategy on ActiveRain, a social network for the real estate industry. (It stands for Active Real Estate Industry Network). She used big photos, not too many words, lots of names, dates and places. As social media has taken over, she has adapted a tiny bit. She shares to Facebook now, but not to Instagram, TikTok or YouTube. She doesn't use video or music. She doesn't pay for marketing. Still, it gets around.

A decade ago she was designated a "rainmaker" on the network for logging more than 500,000 "points" through posted public comments. Currently, based on the same criteria, she is ranked #2 in the state of Arkansas – higher than bloggers in all the large cities.

"The story really comes out in the comments," Duncan says about her blogs, which typically are short. "Since I didn't grow up here, I post what I know and ask for information about what I don't. When I have a photo with people in it, I naturally want to know who they are. I just put it out there and let the readers do the rest."

She frequently calls on her "Searcy Sleuths" for names, dates, details. The same names come up over and over again, like Don Thompson, who lives in California now, and Anita Hart Fuller, who has since been promoted to "Super Sleuth" and become a close personal friend.

Followers find the blog's tone as inviting as the subject matter. Duncan writes with the enthusiasm of the forever young (even though she's well beyond retirement age), with lots of exclamation points and humor.

It is not uncommon for her to blog about a giant tree, or freshly painted barn, or a random encounter. She has been an observer of the world since I was little, and I'm used to her slamming on the brakes when she sees something interesting, like the time she spotted men in medieval costumes practicing for the Renaissance Faire in Berryhill Park.

Her blog is based on the belief that others are curious about things in their community, too.

"I just get so distracted," she explained in a blog from 2011. "I go on to the computer and plan to do some really important things and then WHAM! I see some fascinating picture on my computer that I've saved from somewhere."

In 2009, on a vacation to Florida, she posed with a statue of the World's Tallest Man at Ripley's Believe it Or Not Museum. Little did she know that the man, Robert Wadlow, 8 feet 11 inches tall, had visited Searcy twice in the 1930s, on a

promotional tour for International Shoe Company.

The post and its comments now serve as the online record on the subject, complete with photos. She sees her role as a discussion starter. She'll throw out a photo or clipping from a point in time, and the public does the rest. Most comments remain unedited.

Just because she wrote about a topic once, doesn't mean Duncan won't write about it again. Her repeated posting about landmarks and beloved places has served as historical layering, completing the picture of a town's evolution.

Take for example Morris School for Boys, which operated on 200 acres about 8 miles from town. It had no formal ties to Searcy, and the students and teachers all came from elsewhere. When it closed in 1993, the details of its very existence faded over time.

Her first blog about Morris School in 2012 drew 106 comments from across the country, including some with links to Facebook pages and by people who wanted to track down former classmates

at the school. She let commenters share as much as they wanted, and posted anew every time she found a new photo or had a document. She brought together so many people, through the blog alone, that she was invited to the school's reunion at the old site in 2014.

Barbara Duncan's Blog is not a diary. If you want her life story, you can find it there, but it will take a while. She gives snippets of her personal life and family, but they are hidden among standard posts about architecture, local history, and other people.

In one post from 2011 she shared a yellowed newspaper photo and wrote about working in the tobacco fields of South Georgia as a child. Another tells of her childhood home, which lacked indoor plumbing and a proper lock on the door.

In others she writes about her parents, husband, children and in-laws. She wrote about the time I attempted to print out hard copies of all the blogs (and public

comments) she had produced in her first few years. The effort claimed six 3-ring binders, and I gave up.

Duncan initially moved to Searcy in the mid-1960s as Barbara Smith, the young wife of a career U.S. Air Force officer, Capt. William Ward Smith. Her in-laws were Martin Paul Smith, a retired men's shirt salesman, Baptist deacon and Searcy Alderman, and Madge Smith, who worked part-time at the Ideal Shop.

She was settling into a rent house for her husband's tour of duty in Vietnam, when Capt. Smith, 32, was killed in action in the war. He was Searcy's first Vietnam War casualty. She was a 28-year-old widow with two small children.

Searcy folks came to her aid. Someone encouraged a newly divorced car dealer named Rodger Duncan, whose family business was four blocks away, to reach out to the young widow.

She remarried, returned to college (graduating with an art degree from Harding), taught public school for 12 years and then switched to real estate as a career. She has been a full-time real estate agent for more than 40 years.

She launched Barbara Duncan's Blog when she was in her 60s.

Barbara and Rodger Duncan were married for 54 years until he died in 2022. He was a third-generation Searcy resident, and his family had a truckload of history to share. His grandparents' house still stands on Holmes Road, and the Duncan family car dealership building showroom still stands on Race Avenue next to College Church of Christ. It's leased to the Four Seasons nursery now.

As a married couple, their shenanigans would come up occasionally in the blog, from dancing to the legendary Sonny Burgess at the Searcy Country Club, to backyard gardening. She called him "Hubby" in the blog.

"He's going to put hair on his tomato plants???" she wrote in 2009, when Hubby decided that human hair collected from the barber shop floor would protect his tomato garden from predators. The photos served as proof.

After a few years of general interest blogging, she began to focus on history, and that has become her calling. The Historical Society added a link on the home page to her blog a few years ago, because she was so prolific at gathering unreported information.

Most of her posts start with clippings or photos from school yearbooks, old newspapers, or submitted content. She throws out a subject, and the readers do the rest. Her fans have learned that the blog post needs time to fully develop, like a Polaroid print. So they share it widely and return later, to enjoy what's in the frame.

Duncan has a soft heart for old buildings, and she tries to post every time an aging structure falls to the wrecking ball. She keeps the score with a series called "Another One Bites the Dust" that has accidentally made her the darling of preservationists.

"Better call your mother!" jokes Charles Braswell, an old-house fanatic who lived for more than a decade in the historic Kerr-Booth House at the corner of Center and Pecan.

Racing to the scene to beat the excavator, she shows photos of before and after, explaining that she wants to provide "a death notice" for every lost building. Over time, the teardowns reveal patterns of growth and change. Through her blogs, you can see the old houses that once stood where Legacy Park is, and dressed-up couples in the banquet rooms of the longago Rendezvous, which now houses Hart Construction.

But Duncan brings balance with blogs on the new. Recently, she shared a photo of a shiny new fire hydrant in the dirt of a new housing development planned for the west side of town. No houses yet, but it was her second post on Belmont Estates, which she said has a "grand sounding name." In 50 years, someone searching Searcy's "Belmont Estates" will likely find Barbara Duncan's Blog as the first public record of it. •





Think about a cherry seed - a pit, something we usually throw in the trash and think nothing more about. But when you plant that seed - you see nothing at first. You have to wait for all the conditions to be right. You can fertilize and water it, giving it all the nutrients that it needs to grow, but until the season is right, it won't sprout.

When it does sprout, it's tiny; usually just a little twig with a few leaves, but after that, it grows steadily and fast until it develops into a cherry tree with beautiful flowers that bring forth fruit. And it all started with one tiny little seed.

Lisa Todd knew when God planted that seed in her heart, but just like natural seeds, it didn't start to grow until the conditions were right. Yet, when she looked back, she could see all the watering, fertilizing, pruning, and nurturing that had transpired along the way.

Lisa and her family moved to Searcy from El Dorado in the summer of 1990. Her husband, David, had accepted a coaching job at Harding University. They left in 1993 but returned back to Searcy in 1998. David coached college basketball for sixteen years. He had grown weary of the recruitment trail and time spent away from his family. At forty years old, he made the decision to take his coaching in a different direction. He applied and was accepted into Harding University's Marriage and Family Therapy program.

In early spring, David and Lisa attended a marriage conference in Dallas, TX. One of the guest speakers, Becky Tirabassi, shared how a dramatic encounter with God transformed her spiritual life. She had renewed her diminishing faith with enthusiasm by dedicating one hour a day with God. In order to keep herself accountable and organized, she published a notebook. Lisa purchased "My Prayer Partner Notebook" and returned to Arkansas with renewed excitement; eager to dive in! She had been praying for ways to be more intentional and accountable in her daily walk with Christ.

Her desire was to develop a fresher, stronger and deeper relationship with Jesus.

Within days, Lisa began making a daily appointment with God. Praying and listening to God became spiritual disciplines. Psalms 25:14 says, "The Lord confides in those who fear him; he makes his covenant known to them."

There was a section in the book about praying for what your life would look like 10-

20 years down the road- when kids are grown and retirement is on the horizon. How would God use you? That question made Lisa pause, and that's when she felt the Holy Spirit plant a tiny seed in her heart. She had always felt a desire to serve widows and orphans. Her grandmother had been orphaned at eight years old and spent 8 years in an orphanage. She had also been widowed after 55 years of marriage.



IN SUMMER OF 2006, while visiting Hot Springs, her husband was reading the local newspaper and stated, "Lisa, I found you a dream job!" While it was the job of her dreams, she wasn't interested in moving...but God had other plans. David encouraged her to apply and two weeks later she was packing up her classroom in Rose Bud and headed to Hot Springs. The move was a leap of faith, but Lisa knew this was God's plan, she was trusting Him and He didn't disappoint!

Lisa loved her new job as a gifted and talented teacher at Lakeside School District. David landed a job as a Licensed Professional Counselor at Hillcrest Children's Home...an orphanage! James **1:27** says:

"Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to take care of widows and orphans in their distress and keep oneself from being polluted by the world." (NIV)

There it was, the Word said it plain as day. Lisa had a heart for widows and now David had a job providing mental health counseling to children who were without homes...orphans!

Interesting fact, Lakeside Schools and Hillcrest Children's Home are located about a mile apart on Malvern Ave. Before David went to work for Hillcrest, he would tell Lisa, "They need me," when they drove by the campus. It was like a magnet drawing him to the children. Before he had the chance to inquire about an opening, Lisa's dad mentioned that his new neighbor was the executive director at Hillcrest. Her dad was new to the neighborhood and they had met each other at the mailbox. Her dad mentioned that his son-in-law was a Christian counselor and had just moved to Hot Springs. A meeting was set up and within a short time, David was hired at Hillcrest. They did need him after all! Look at God... again he had the perfect plan!

Hillcrest Children's Home is located on a 52-acre campus that is owned and operated by the Assemblies of God. It was founded in 1944 in obedience to the scripture mandate to care for orphans. It began as a vision of a woman who was disappointed that she was unable to serve on the foreign mission field. As a young woman, Gladys Hinson was inspired by another missionary to open a home for orphaned and abandoned children. She welcomed three children who had lost their parents and five children who had been abandoned in a cold abandoned house in another state. That's how the Hillcrest Children's Home started and it is now one of the largest Christian organizations involved in the compassionate care of children and families.

David loved his work at Hillcrest and Lisa planned to join him as a part-time caseworker after her retirement from teaching in 2013. However, later in the fall, Lisa's dad was diagnosed with a brain tumor that required major surgery. Complications ensued and she would become his primary caregiver in the year to follow. During one of his extended hospital stays, Lisa met Peaches, a lady whose husband was a patient across the hall from her dad in the hospital. They formed a fast friendship and kept in touch after her father was discharged from the hospital.

Several months later, Peaches' husband died and she became a widow. After the funeral, Lisa noticed her friend withdraw from life. Her normal outgoing personality was quenched with grief. Peaches was devastated and depressed having lost the love of her life. Lisa wanted to help and reached out to her new friend. Not realizing at the time, the Lord was preparing her for ministering to widows. Over time, Peaches began to slowly heal. Grief has no timetable. It's different for everyone but as a Christian with great faith, Peaches began to pray with Lisa and attend Bible Study Fellowship. At the time, they were studying the book of Ruth. Peaches knew the timing was perfect and that it was God's way

of confirming that she too had a "kinsman redeemer." For several years Lisa and Peaches both served as volunteers at BSF. Together, they prayed regularly and those prayers led to the birth of When We Becomes Me, a widows ministry. Lisa lovingly calls Peaches her #1 widow.

In February of 2017, Lisa's dad passed away. No longer having the caregiver responsibility, she began looking for ways to serve widows and orphans. The seed that had been planted years earlier began to spring forth. On a Sunday morning in the late summer of 2017, she was sitting in church and noticed three widows sitting on a pew directly in front of her. She felt the Holy Spirit's nudge reminding her of that seed that had been planted almost 20 years ago. "Invite them to join you for a meal and share what I planted in your heart." After church, Lisa was obedient and invited them to have breakfast with her the following Wednesday. After talking with them it became painfully clear that there was still a lot of grief and that there was very little support for these widows. People that were there to support them initially returned to their daily lives. Former friends of the couple stopped inviting them over or out to eat as in the past, it was awkward now. Often they felt like "a third wheel," isolated and lonely. They were left with feelings that no one seemed to understand and grief that was pervasive. A few stated that at times God even felt distant. Once regular Bible reading and prayer was now sometimes impossible. Lisa listened intently and wanted somehow to find a way to ease their pain of grief and loss.

One of the ladies, Lana, mentioned that she felt like widows needed a safe space where they could share their hearts and tell their stories without any judgment or guilt. Family and friends often don't understand and well-meaning folks often give advice that comes across to widows as hurtful and cruel.

LISA, LANA, AND PEACHES began to plan and pray. Less than a week later they were contacted by an organization that hosted retreats for bereaved parents. "While We're Waiting" had a beautiful new 12000 sq foot retreat facility and were offering the use of it at no charge. Wow, who does that? God!

From August 31 to November 6, 2017, all the pieces fell into place and eight desperate widows arrived looking for hope for their shattered hearts. Lisa, Lana, and Peaches welcomed these ladies and allowed them to rest, relax and share their stories of grief and loss.

Each weekend retreat hosts eight widows. They share delicious meals, music, stories, and laughs as well as shed some tears. After sharing, they have opportunities to visit, take nature walks, craft, nap, or feed the resident donkey, J.D. They talk about topics like graveside visits, handling holidays, birthdays, and anniversaries. They discuss how to deal with hurtful comments made by well-meaning friends and family. Many come to the retreats not knowing anyone but leave having a common bond and a new set of friends.

Since the fall of 2017, almost 100 widows have attended these widows retreats in Hot Springs. It's a beautiful and transformational weekend for these precious ladies.

However, God was just getting started and the seed that was planted in Lisa's heart was about to become a full-grown tree loaded with blooms and about to start bearing fruit.

Lisa and David, now both retired, had moved back to Searcy in August 2018.



# When You Have To Reinvent Yourself

"Wow! They really know how to live," I thought to myself as I waved at the truck that drove by my house, horse trailer in tow. I knew exactly who it was- the patriotic paint job and the words "Love to ride" set it apart from all the other white trucks in the community. Lee and Cindy Fonken were off to do what they did nearly every day since Lee retired- they were off to one of the many horse trails in the state. They were one of those couples that just loved being together. They thrived in each other's company. They were not only husband and wife, they were best friends as well.

They had worked hard to get to this point in their lives. Both had worked for the US Postal Service, Lee was a veteran, and they had raised 2 boys, Matt and Nick, (both Eagle Scouts) along with hundreds of the best Missouri Foxtrotter Trail horses in the nation.

They were the kind of people that gave generously and loved like they had never been hurt - friends, family, neighbors, and community. If anyone had earned this period of doing what they loved and were passionate about together, it was them.

They rode so much that Cindy accumulated 39,591 miles and her horse, Kate's 007 was named Missouri Foxtrotting trail horse of the year in 2016, 2017, and 2018. He was the first to win the title 3 years in a row and is in the Missouri Foxtrotter Hall of Fame at Ava, Missouri. Lee came in second place with his horse Granite and at the time, had accumulated 27,363 miles.

They decided that 2019 would be Lee's year to get first and she'd take second. They rode all year in all kinds of weather, but at the Pink Ribbon Ride at Pine Grove in October 2019, Cindy had a hard time getting on her horse on the second day. They laughed and joked about it, but deep down, Lee knew something was wrong.

He took her to the doctor and the next 2 months turned into a heart-wrenching nightmare. Cindy had stage four brain cancer. Lee cared for her at home. They celebrated Thanksgiving, Christmas, Cindy's 69th birthday, and their 37th wedding anniversary on December 28th. She passed away peacefully at their home on December 30th.

Before she passed, Lee promised her two things. He would keep playing his fiddle at church, and he'd keep riding.

Lee came in second place once again for trail miles in 2019. He couldn't ride after October because he was taking care of Cindy. His competitor beat him by 50 miles, but by that point, it was no longer important to him.

He felt like he'd lost his right arm. It was a grief and sorrow that few understood. He still took care of the four horses they had left, but riding wasn't the same without Cindy.

He started going to grief share at church, and that helped.

"When your spouse dies, it's not like losing anyone else like your Mom, Dad, or Grandparent. It affects everything you do; all your routines. You've got to change them all and reinvent yourself or it will kill you."


He explored other interests and hobbies, including fishing, playing his fiddle, attending Bible Study at church, and even bought an original 1925 model T car.

He still went on some trail rides, including two yearly memorial rides in honor of Cindy in Louisiana and in Tennessee. He would usually take Granite and one of his sons would ride Seven. But aside from the organized rides that he wanted to attend in honor of her or the ones that he felt obligated to attend as part of his role on the trail committee for the Missouri Foxtrotter Horse Breed Association, Granite and Seven spent a good chunk of time as pasture ornaments.

God has a funny way of working both ends of something together, and that was certainly the case with myself and my neighbor, Lee.

I had ridden since I was a kid. Mom instilled a deep love of horses in me. First, there was a big Appaloosa mare, named Sis, that was my childhood horse and one of my best friends. Then, Dusty, a Missouri Foxtrotter gelding that taught me that I could love another horse again after I lost Sis and how to ride a gaited horse. My mom owned both of these horses, and is gracious enough







to share them with me. Horseback riding has always been the place that we connected, no matter how cross-ways we got, as mothers and daughters are prone to do. She also told me 2 things:

- 1. "If I die with some horse-related accident or riding a horse, I want you to know that I died HAPPY.."
- "You'd BETTER take care of my horse!"

We saw Lee at the local fire department smoke-off competition in May of 2022. I saw Lee visiting with my husband, Shanon, but didn't think anything of it. Lee approached me later and said something that I did not expect. I don't think either of us knew at the time what was coming - but that's how God's blessings work sometimes. "Why don't you come ride Seven?" he asked. "Just consider him yours to ride. He needs ridden and he's getting fat just sitting out in the pasture."

Cindy had offered to let me come ride before, but I never took her up on it because it felt awkward to me. Now, after her passing, I sorely wished I had taken her up on the invite, even if I didn't quite know how to go about it. I wasn't going to pass up the opportunity again! What better way to honor Cindy than by playing a small role in taking care of her beloved horse? I told him I'd be by a few days later.

#### That was the day that the magic started to happen.

I remember going out to the pasture with Lee to get Seven for the first time with his halter on my shoulder. I slipped the halter over his nose and gazed into those big liquid brown eyes and felt something clench in my chest. My eyes spilled over and I felt a place in my heart heal that I didn't even realize was still broken. "I think this is gonna work." I heard Lee say behind me. I don't think either of us knew how right he was.

It didn't happen overnight. It took time and a summer of riding Seven in the pasture, but we bonded to each other. Then, in September of 2022, Lee took me to my first organized National Trail Ride at King's Ranch. I was nervous, but when Seven turned his head to look me in the eye and gently blew air through his nose twice into my hand, I knew he was going to take care of me.

Seven crossed terrain that I didn't even know horses could cross, without a flick of his ear. Though I had ridden a lot, I had never ridden like this.

I wasn't sure how the other riders would receive me. That was wasted worry. I introduced myself to a lady named Sherry that was keeping paperwork straight and instead of taking my offered hand for a handshake, she wrapped me in a warm, motherly hug. At the age of 41, I was the "baby" of the trail ride. Most of the other riders were retired with kids my age.


But I was hooked. Those 12 miles through rugged terrain may have left my body thankful for the aleive I had taken earlier in the day, but I felt like a kid at Christmas. It was the same excitement and anticipation, and it did not leave me disappointed.


Lee talked me into joining a few organizations to keep track of my hours and miles. I enjoyed the hours spent both on the trail and in the truck as he drove the trailer to various destinations around the state. He told me stories of his and Cindy's rides - including taking a friend with their family (including kids) on a mule ride to the bottom of the Grand Canyon for her 70th birthday. They also rode the Peekaboo Trail in Utah and took their horses to an American Heart Association Ride on Myrtle beach. The pictures show a smiling Cindy on Seven with the ocean waves crashing on the beach behind them.

Perhaps one of the most amazing ones was the "Shore to Shore" ride in Michigan that spans 250 miles in 10 days. It goes from the shore of Lake Michigan to Lake Huron, with primitive camping at the end of each day. They rode that one with their kids, who were camp favorites since they could start a fire no matter how fierce the wind was.

They broke ice off the water buckets to allow the horses to drink in the morning and were sweating in 98-degree heat by the afternoon. Even more amazing is the "Double Cross," which is the same as the Shore to Shore ride except you turn around and go back, making the ride 500 miles. Lee put brand new metal shoes on his horse, Granite at the beginning of the ride. By day 10, they broke in half, eroded away by all the miles.

I'm not sure that Lee knew what he was getting himself into when he told me that I could ride Seven, but we've started exploring a lot of the places that he and Cindy used to ride around the state. We've also started trimming trails on the back part of his property to clean them up for a future memorial trail ride in honor of Cindy. He's not riding alone anymore, and I get the opportunity to see spectacular sites that I had no idea were this close. I'm learning a lot, with Lee's and Seven's gentle teachings. I know that each ride is a gift and I greet each one with child-like enthusiasm. I know better than to take it for granted, and I thank God for each and every one.







They need to know that they matter just as much as everyone else in the world and that they are not looked down upon because they are in foster care and have had unfortunate circumstances happen to

them. They need to feel the love! That's why I am so impressed with and thankful to the Imagine and Believe Foundation. They are making this happen. They are partnering with foster families so that these foster children can feel loved, accepted, and well cared for. The donors are supporting this and playing a big part in this ministry, because by donating items or their time, they are empowering Imagine and Believe to help more people and make the foster children feel how special and loved they truly are.

To me, this is what is really important: Make those around you feel loved! After all, that's the greatest commandment. "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" - Matthew 22:39. 
